SLOVENIAN CLUB ADELAIDE 1957 – 2017

60 DIAMOND JUBILEE

Slovenian Club Adelaide this year celebrates a major milestone with 60 years since the club was first established in 1957.

People over the decades have poured in their time, money, blood, sweat, and devotion to establish a Slovenian presence in Adelaide, and this is physically demonstrated over this time period with the building of two club premises and the ownership of a farm at Hahndorf. What have made these buildings truly Slovenian is that they have been filled with Slovenian culture through choirs, language schools, food, and of course Slovenian people.

Culture is an integral part of being Slovenian and this is no better illustrated than the countless amount of cultural events celebrated at Slovenian Club Adelaide over the years.

It is very important to celebrate this major milestone in a significant way that is befitting to the Slovenian people who have literally poured their life into Slovenian Club Adelaide.

The Slovenian community has magnificent clubrooms at Dudley Park which all members can now enjoy. This is not to be taken for granted.

In the mid 1950's a headcount was done on the number of Slovenians in Adelaide, and the results showed there were 3,500 Slovenians living here. This largish number of Slovenians made it feasible to establish Slovenian Club Adelaide in 1957, thus satisfying a need for Slovenians to group together for social functions.

So if there were 3,500 Slovenians in Adelaide in the mid 1950's, and we consider this group the first generation, the population of people with Slovenian heritage must be a sizeable number given that we now have in addition the second, third, and fourth generations. The number of people with Slovenian ancestry as shown in the Australian Bureau of Statistics is way off the mark as the 2011 Census only shows 1,313 people. The reasons for this could be that over the past 100 years Slovenia has been governed, ruled, occupied by other countries eg Austria, Hungary, Italy, Germany, and was part of Yugoslavia, so people when answering the Census could give one of those countries as their place of originating ancestry. In addition Slovenia in its own right has only been independent for 25 years, having gained independence in 1991. This is the first time Slovenia has been truly independent for 1,000 years.

Looking back over time to 1957, here is a list of the first Slovenian Club Adelaide committee members. We should be ever grateful for this founding group of people to have the vision to formally establish a Slovenian presence in Adelaide.

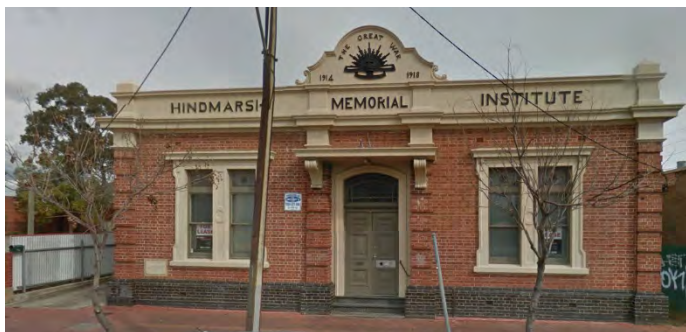

I would sincerely like to thank Governor Hieu Van Le AC for the forthcoming reception which will be held on Thursday June 15, 2017. 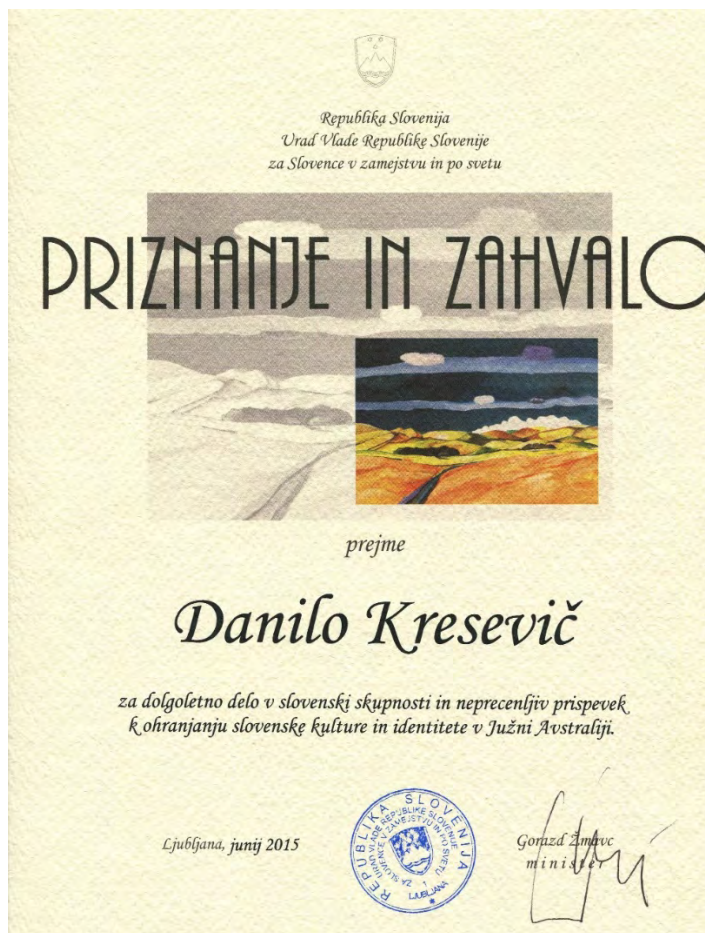
Danilo and Ivanka Kreševič

Danilo and his late wife Ivanka have contributed enormously to the Slovenian community in Adelaide, and to the South Australian community over many, many years of selfless work, showing unbound empathy, understanding, care, concern, and giving to their fellow human being. The passing of Ivanka in January 2017 was sudden and a complete shock to our community.



Family and people always came first to Danilo and Ivanka. Caring, sharing, nurturing, and compassion were the trademarks that they lived by and the values that they stood for.

Danilo was the first president of Slovenian Club Adelaide, and both he and Ivanka were highly active members of the Slovenian Catholic Church in Adelaide. In 2015 Danilo received an award from the Office of Slovenians Abroad (Urad Vlade Republike Slovenije za Slovence v zamejstvu in po svetu) for this lifelong community service.



Charity work has been a large focus in their lives with Meals on Wheels, working in the kitchen and delivering meals, three to four days a week for the past thirteen and a half years. Danilo showed great support to the Spastic Centre during his working life when over a period of twenty years part of his salary was deducted in support of this great cause. In recognition of his generosity the Spastic Centre awarded him with a much deserved trophy.

Culture Day - Prešeren Day - Prešernov dan

February 12, 2017

Slovenian Culture Day is one of the biggest days in the Slovenian calendar year. Culture is so important that Slovenia is one of the few countries in the world, or even the only country in the world, that has a public holiday dedicated to it. Slovenian Culture Day is also known as Prešeren Day, named after the famous Slovenian poet France Prešeren. In the main square of Ljubljana, you will not find a statute of a military general, or of a politician, or of a religious leader, but that of France Prešeren. Culture Day in Slovenia is actually observed on February 8, the day of the death of Prešeren.

Visiting oktet Jurij Dalmatin from Slovenia participated on our Culture Day with their wonderful voices. To mark this special occasion both they and Slovenian Choir Adelaide sang the famous Slovenian song V Dolini tihi together, as well as Kolko kapljic, tolko let.

Obtaining an EU Blue card in Slovenia

The EU Blue card in Slovenia is a special permit for living and working in the Republic of Slovenia for foreign citizens (citizens of non-EU member states), who are highly qualified specialists. With EU Blue card in Slovenia you will obtain work and residence permit in Slovenia.

Who can receive an EU Blue card in Slovenia?

If you are a highly qualified individual and have a certificate of completed higher education in any country, you can submit the documentation for obtaining an EU Blue card in Slovenia. In accordance with your education, you also have to receive a higher salary, which has to be 1.5 times higher than the average salary in Slovenia. The certificate of higher education must be confirmed by the competent institutions of the Republic of Slovenia.



The EU Blue card in Slovenia is issued by the administrative unit and confirmed by the employment service of the Republic of Slovenia.

In order to receive an EU Blue card in Slovenia you have to submit a package of documentation to the Embassy of Slovenia in Canberra, like:

Valid copy of your passport
Commercial health insurance
Certificate of non-criminal record from your home country
Filled-out application, etc.
If your employer requests an EU Blue card in Slovenia for you, the employment service will request the following data:

Confirmation of higher education (your diploma has to be translated into Slovenian language, notarized and certified by ENIC-NARIC)
Signed employment contract for at least one year. The salary has to be 1.5 times higher than the average salary in Slovenia
Statement from the employment service of Slovenia, that among Slovene citizens there are no such specialists/candidates for certain job position
Confirmation that the employer is registered in the commercial register of the Republic of Slovenia
Confirmation that the Employer regularly pays all taxes and fees
Request from the employer for certain job vacancy
Confirmation that a foreigner meets all the requirements and criteria for certain job position and meets all the requirements of the law.

The sausage is called Kranjska klobasa in Slovenian and it is protected by the European Commission as a product that originates in Slovenia. The Kransky sausage was brought to Australia by post WW2 Slovenian migrants.

If you see someone selling kransky sausages attributing it to a country other than Slovenia, please tell them where the kransky sausage originates – Slovenia! Kransky sausage is as important to us Slovenians and our identity as champagne is to the French.

Europe Day (9 May 2017) is an annual celebration symbolising the peace and unity of Europe.

In recognition of this occasion, the Hawke EU Centre for Mobilities, Migrations and Cultural Transformations presents Slovenia in Europe Now – Is there an Alternative?, a public lecture by the Slovenian Ambassador to Australia, H.E. Ms Helena Drnovšek Zorko.

Forming part of the Hawke EU Centre Ambassador Lecture Series, the Ambassador will explore Slovenia's place within the European community, and the many challenges the country has faced since gaining independence 26 years ago.

A cocktail reception will follow the lecture of which all guests are invited to attend. We will also use this occasion to announce the winners of some of our recent postgraduate fellowships overseas.

Lecture overview

Slovenia - Land in Between, a recent history book, concisely and intelligently describes the country which has always been at the crossroads of migration, foreign political rules, different religions, languages, and landscapes. In the lack of its own statehood, language became the most important unifying political feature, and Culture has been highly valued among Slovenians.

Culture has, indeed, reflected the zeitgeist - and not always with a capital C. Neue Slowenische Kunst, NSK, in the final era of Tito's regime put the mirror to its soft totalitarianism. From the beginning of the nineties the virtual NSK State in Time - with its insignia of a real state, passports, flag, army, its anthem, and its Culture - continues to trespass the boundaries of reality.

Twenty six years ago Slovenians overwhelmingly voted for independence, and it was the vision of a united and peaceful Europe that the country again approved by almost 90 percent in the 2003 referendum on EU membership. In 2017, 26 year after its independence and 25 years after the start of diplomatic relations with Australia, Slovenia has been continuously challenged with the notions of identity in turbulent times, which not only force Europe to reconsider its own path, but to confront the fact that, in an increasingly restless world, there is no alternative.



H.E. Ms Helena Drnovšek Zorko was appointed Ambassador of the Republic of Slovenia to Australia in October 2015. She previously served as Ambassador in Japan and the Republic of Korea. Prior to that (2004 – 2010) she held the position of the Head of the Division of the International Cultural Relations at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, focusing on the intercultural dialogue and the role of culture in the external relations. Before joining the Ministry of Foreign Affairs she worked as an adviser for cultural affairs for Slovenians living abroad.

Slovenian Ana Roš declared world's best female chef

Ljubljana, 24 January - Chef Ana Roš of the Hiša Franko restaurant in the western town of Kobarid has put Slovenian cuisine on the map by becoming the World's Best Female Chef. The World's 50 Best Restaurants culinary portal picked her for the prestigious title due to her precision, affection to details and her imagination.

Although cooking had never been the intended path for Roš, the daughter of a doctor and a journalist, her plans changed as she decided to take over the restaurant of her husband's parents in the Soča Valley.

"She took on the kitchen at Hiša Franko with no culinary training, no experience in running a restaurant and no real desire to give up her ambitious career plans.

"Almost 20 years later, she has put her country on the gastronomic map, starred in her own episode of Netflix's hit series Chef's Table, and been voted by her peers as The World's Best Female Chef," the portal says in presenting Roš.

"Although there are no Michelin stars in Slovenia and the country is somewhat overshadowed by the culinary successes of its neighbours - Italy and Austria, in particular - Roš has propelled Hiša Franko onto the global gastronomic stage and earned her place among the world's top cooks."

Hiša Franko is described as a "cosy family restaurant, located in an idyllic rural setting overlooking the lush Soča Valley", which "attracts customers from across the globe to sample Roš's unique five- and nine-course tasting menus".

Public broadcaster RTV Slovenija said the portal, which makes its rankings based on a poll by British magazine Restaurant of

international chefs, restaurateurs, gourmards and restaurant critics, was likely to list Hiša Franko among this year's top 100 restaurants in the world.

The only other Slovenian restaurant to ever make it on the list was the prestigious Ljubljana-based JB, which ranked 89th in 2010. This year's top restaurants will be presented in April.

Roš will receive her World's Best Female Chef Award at a ceremony in Melbourne, Australia, on 5 April. Last year the award was conferred on chef Dominique Crenn of the Ateliera Crenn restaurant in San Francisco.

Slovenia's Hiša Franko For The First Time Among The Best 100 Restaurants In The World!

When the World's 50 Best Restaurants academy chose Ana Roš, in January, for best female chef in the world, one could already anticipate that Hiša Franko would make it on the list of best restaurants in the world.

The expectations were confirmed today, a good week before the announcement of this year's best restaurants in the world in Melbourne. The Restaurant magazine, which organizes the event, announced the list of best restaurant from positions 51 to 100.



Hiša Franko

As a newcomer on the list, the Hiša Franko restaurant ended up in the high 69th position, leaving behind culinary institutions as Chateaubriand from Paris (93rd place), Sydney's Quay restaurant (95th place), St. John from London (91st place), Maaemo in Oslo (79th place) and the New York-based Per Se (87th place).

Trailing Hiša Franko are also restaurants headed by Ana's predecessors to the throne of best female chef in the world: Dominique Crenn (Atelier Crenn, San Francisco, newcomer placing at number 83) and Helena Rizzo (Mani, Sao Paulo, 81st place).

This is not Slovenia's first placement on the list of best restaurants. Before Hiša Franko there was the JB restaurant, headed by Janez Bratovž, which placed 89th in 2010.

Never heard of this cute gem of a country before? You wouldn't be the only one. Its uncommon that this country makes it to the top of a European holiday. In fact it wasn't on our minds either until now but we are glad we made it to this lesser known side of Europe.

We recently came back from a few days of exploring Slovenia by road and adding a fair mix of active hiking just like the Slovenes love to do. In whatever little we were able to see in

this short trip the country has left us in awe; strolling through thick forests to hidden waterfalls, finding chameleons on the trails in Tolmin gorge, walking the wooden walkways on the edge of vintgar gorges, hiking to a panoramic viewpoint over Lake bled, seeing the sunset from the church tower in Piran, marveling at the stalagmite formations in the Postjona caves, admiring the marvel of Predjama castle etched in a cliff face with a cave under it, sampling local food at the farmers market in Ljubljana, stomachaching the 50 hairpin bends of the Vršič pass in the thick of fog, falling for the magic of autumn and by the end believing in the little dragon. Everyday we got to see sights that we have never come across before on our travels. Here are a few images that will make you want to experience this country for yourselves. Consider yourself warned if scrolling down gives you a serious wanderlust.

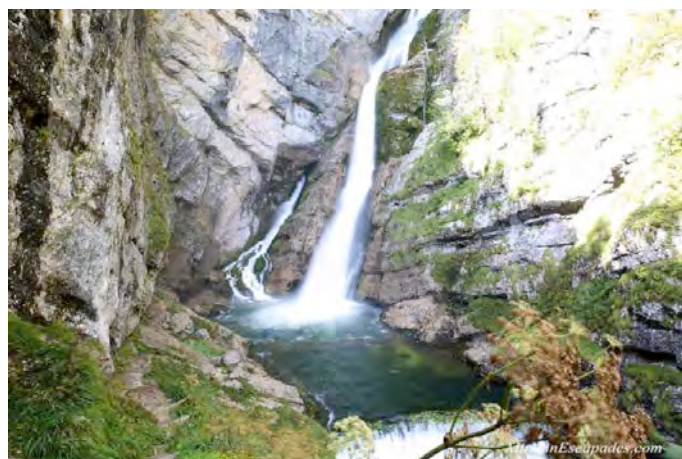
Predjama castle

A very unique castle built on a cliff face is a not to miss highlight in Slovenia. Legend has it that Erazem Lueger resided here who was considered to be a robin hood by the then locals, stealing from the rich and giving away to the poor. While the story may or may not be true, the castle is surely fascinating, it is built in a cavern over a 14km long cave system with secret passages and an underground river. Now how often do you get to use all these words in the same sentence.



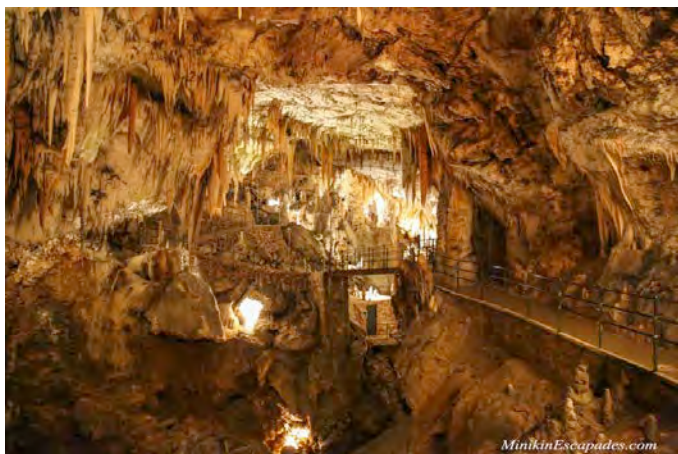
Savice waterfall

A waterfall that is regarded as source of life by Slovenes and it is not hard to see why. This waterfall reachable by a quick 20 min walk dramatically tumbles down in two falls feeding an emerald pool. The trail through the woods along the Sava river is very well maintained and is easily accessible from Bohinj.



Postojna caves

It is pure magical experience to view the amazing formations of stalagmites in these caves which are over 24 kilometer long . These caves are carved by the Pivka river over millions of years and are a mystical place. It is easy to spend hours marveling at the ceilings of these caves. There are huge naturally formed halls right next to each other with completely different formations from spaghetti like stalagmites to thick curtains carved in limestone from unimaginable years of dripping limestone water.



Piran

We arrived in Piran just in time for the sunset over the mediterranean sea painting the red roofs of this town in a golden glow. This little town is on a piece of land jutting into the sea. We went up the stairs of the bell tower at St George church and were treated to a spectacular sunset and gorgeous views of the Tartini square below.

Tolmin gorge

This narrow gorge tucked deep in the Soca valley offers stunning views of the Tolminka river as it twists and turns creating striking waterfalls. A well marked trail that takes less than an hour to complete is the ideal way to admire this offbeat natural attraction. Don't be surprised if there is no one else around, just enjoy the tranquility of having the place all to yourself.



Lake Bled

If there is one image of Slovenia, people would instantly fall in love with, it is the postcard view of a church on an island floating on the emerald green waters of lake Bled. We had to see it ourselves and took a quick hike to the Ostrica viewpoint

for this magnificent view. The park bench is also a great spot to enjoy a picnic.



Lake Bohinj

For a calm and serene experience we would prefer the Lake Bohinj, a half hour drive from the famous Lake Bled this is an absolute must. The water here is super calm and only disturbed by the occasional dip of a paddle of a kayaker.

Soca river

This beautiful river has the most amazing electric blue color we have ever seen. In fact the entire soca valley is an adventure paradise, our favorite activities here were canyoning, kayaking and rafting available for a range of rapids to satisfy adrenaline of every level.

Slap Kozjak Waterfall

Imagine tiptoeing on a wooden pathway, holding to the iron cable and arriving at an emerald pool at whose far end a gushing waterfall empties itself, this image turn real at the Slap Kozjak waterfall. Just outside the town of Kobaird, a well marked trail following the Soca river through thick woods and drowsy streams leads to this gem of a waterfall.

Jasna lake

Very close to Kranjska gora is the Jasna lake, it is actually two lakes separated by a small strip of land. The famous Ibex statue adorns its shores and flying fish swim around aimlessly in the crystal clear waters of the lake. One can easily spend hours idling along its shores or take a pleasant walk along the entire lake.

Vršič pass

The 50 hairpin bends leading to the top of the pass, the highest in Slovenia would probably test the best of the drivers but the drive goes by some of the spectacular scenery of triglav national park. The Julian alps were shrouded in a thick of mist while we were there and it made us love the drive even more. It looks like this in autumn on a clearer day though.

Vintgar gorge

We went exploring the Vintgar gorge and the waterfalls cascading down from the Radvona river which ultimately feeds Lake Bled. Rushing emerald green waters pushed through the narrow canyon walls below us while we walked next to it over wooden paths. It is an ideal detour from the nearby lake Bled and the entire gorge can be experienced in a pleasant hour long walk.



Triglav national park

Triglav is the highest mountain in Slovenia and Slovenians love to trek up to the top. We were content with exploring the lower valleys of the Triglav national park for this short trip. This part of Slovenia with wooden chalets, rolling green meadows and towering granite peaks is surely straight out of fairytale.

Ljubljana

After all the active exploring on our trip we loved the relaxed vibes of Ljubljana. With its many bridges and cobbled streets the old town has a romantic feel. The coffee shops and farmers market along the Ljubljana river meant we were serenaded by artisan cheese and loads of caffeine the entire time we spent here.



Bled Cake

We know we said 14 pictures, but we couldn't resist sneaking this picture of Bled lake, just like we couldn't resist eating it in copious amount. This melt in the mouth custard topped with a crispy layer of a pastry sheet is a must when in Lake Bled region. It surely is up there on the top of our list of favorite cakes. Hands down the best place to taste this is at the Slascicarna Smon, a traditional cafe slightly off the main street in Bled.

Why 2017 is Poised to Become a Standout Year For Slovenia Tourism

Slovenia's tourism office likes to promote the fact that it's the only country with the word 'love' in its name.

Before First Lady Melania Trump became the country's unofficial but, arguably, most famous ambassador, Slovenia registered a whisper of a blip on the international travel map.

Eclipsed by its more popular travel neighbors Italy and Croatia, a few years ago the best Slovenia's tourism office could muster was a play on words for its tagline.

But thanks in large part to the US election, the Central European country has drawn the attention of the notoriously fickle food and travel world which recently pronounced one of its chefs the best female chef in the world and Slovenia itself a beacon of sustainable tourism.

As the first foreign-born First Lady in nearly two centuries, it's understandable that Melania Trump's country of origin would have elicited global interest.

According to the latest figures, Slovenia received a record 10.8 million overnight stays in 2016, up eight percent compared to 2015.

Of those overnight stays, the country saw an 11 percent spike in foreign tourist arrivals, led mostly by visitors from Italy, Austria, Croatia, Germany, Serbia and the UK.

Last year, the capital city of Ljubljana enjoyed the spotlight as the European Green Capital of 2016, for strategies that include a zero waste program, more bike lanes, electric trains and green buses to combat air pollution.

The designation also drew the attention of a trade fair marketed as the world's largest, ITB Berlin, which named Slovenia their country partner at this year's edition.

At the same event, which wrapped up over the weekend, the National Geographic World Legacy Awards named Slovenia's tourist board the winner of their Destination Leadership award. With nearly 60 percent of its land protected, Slovenia is touted as one of the world's most sustainable destinations.

"Our vision is for a 100 percent green Slovenia", said Maja Pak, Director of the Slovenian Tourism Office at ITB Berlin.

World's best female chef 2017

Meanwhile, the First Lady isn't the only formidable woman putting Slovenia on the world map.

Earlier this year, chef Ana Ros of Hisa Franko restaurant in Kobarid's Soca Valley, just three kilometers from the Italian border, was pronounced the world's best female chef from the group that ranks the World's 50 Best Restaurants.

Completely self-taught, Ros mastered the craft and developed her own culinary style by dining at other restaurants for inspiration.

At Hisa Franko, dishes give local Slovenian ingredients like homemade butter, Tolminc cheese and lamb leading roles. Ros will be a familiar face to viewers of the Netflix series "Chef's Table," which featured the chef last year and highlighted her knack for combining surprising flavors, a talent food writer Alec Lobrano described as akin to "a broken haiku."

"When you read squid, sweetbreads, walnuts and Tolminc cheese, you can't imagine what these flavors are going to taste like when I put it in my mouth," Lobrano says.

"But then you're in the midst of eating the said thing and suddenly you're surprised by how spectacular the food is." Melania Trump's hometown of Sevnica is also capitalizing on its newfound fame, and is heavily promoting itself as a tourist destination anchored by Sevnica Castle, which dominates the city center.
